Luke 22:7

Luke 22:39-44

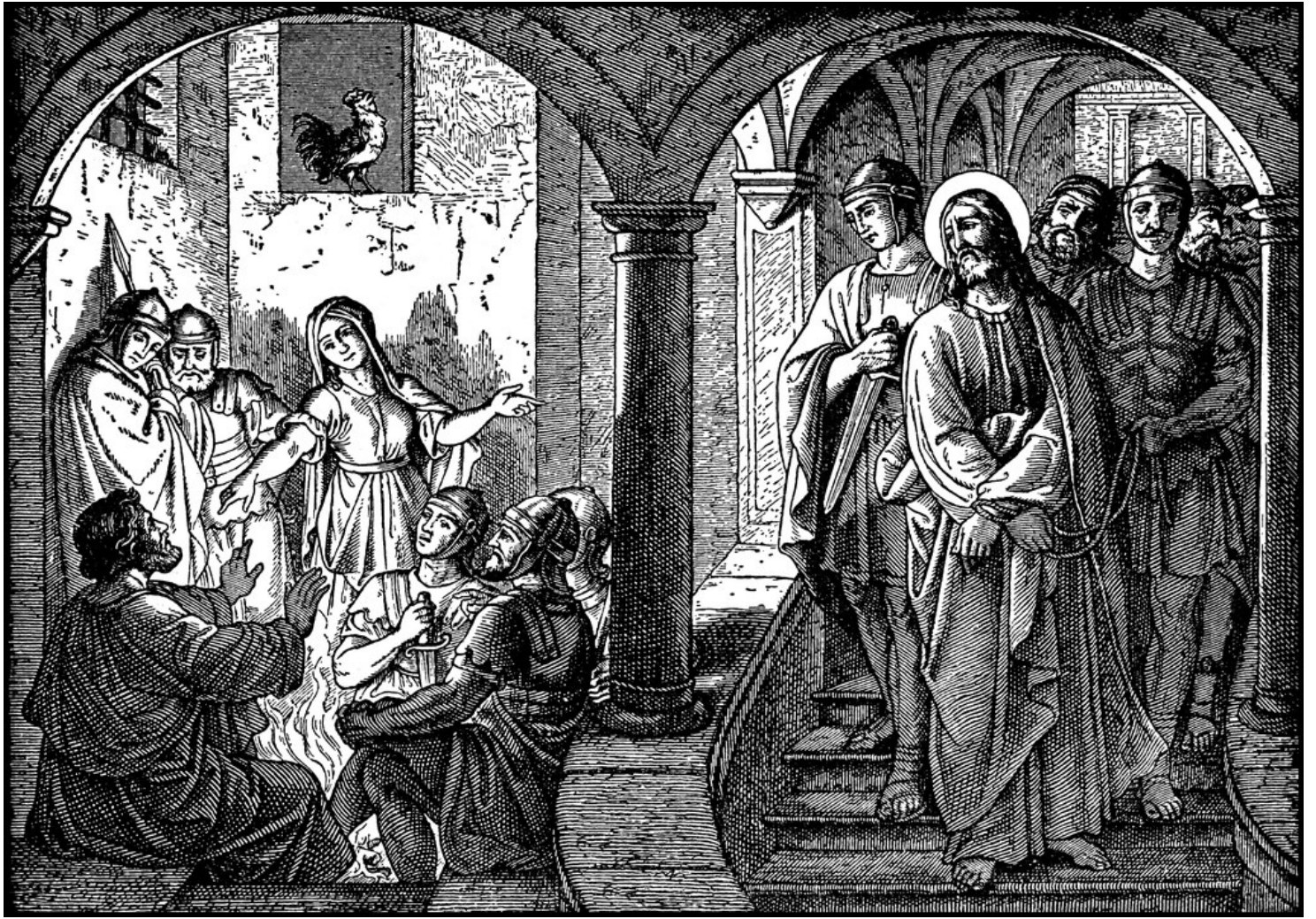


Station 2

Luke 22:47-48

Jesus Arrested

Station 3

Luke 22:54-61

Peter denies Jesus

Peter followed at a distance. A fire was kindled in the courtyard and Peter joined them. A servant girl saw him and said, "This man was with him." But he denied it. Later someone else said, "You also are one of them." "Man I am not!" Peter replied. Later another asserted, "Certainly this fellow was with him for his is a Galilean." Station 4

Luke 22:66-70

Station 5

Luke 23:13-24

Jesus Condemned

Pilate called together the chief priests and said, “you brought me this man as one who was inciting the people to rebellion. I have examined him in your presence and have found no basis for your charges. Neither has Herod, he has done nothing to deserve death. Therefore, I will punish him and then release him.” They kept shouting, “Crucify him!! Crucify him!!” For the third time he asked, “Why? What crime has this man committed?” With loud shouts they demanded he be crucified and their shouts prevailed. So Pilate decided to grant their demands and surrendered Jesus to their will.



Station 6

John 19:1-2

Jesus crowned with thorns

Then Pilate took Jesus and had him flogged. The soldiers twisted a CROWN OF THORNS and put it on his head. They clothed him in purple and went up to him again and again saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and they struck him in the face with their hands.

Mark 15:19-20

Again and again they struck him on the head with a staff and spit on him. And when they had mocked him they removed the purple robe and they led him out to crucify him.



Station 7

Luke 23:26

Simon helps Jesus

As they led him away, they laid hold of a certain man, Simon a Cyrenian, who was coming from the country, and on him they laid the cross that he might bear it after Jesus.

John 19:17

Carrying his own cross, Jesus started to the place of the skull.
(Golgotha).



Station 8

Luke 23:27-29

Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem

Many people followed him, including women who mourned and wailed for him. Jesus said to them, “Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me; weep for yourselves and your children. For the time will come when you will say, “Blessed are the barren, the wombs that never bore and breasts that never nursed!”

This happened that the scripture might be fulfilled which said "They divided my garments among them and cast lots for my clothing."

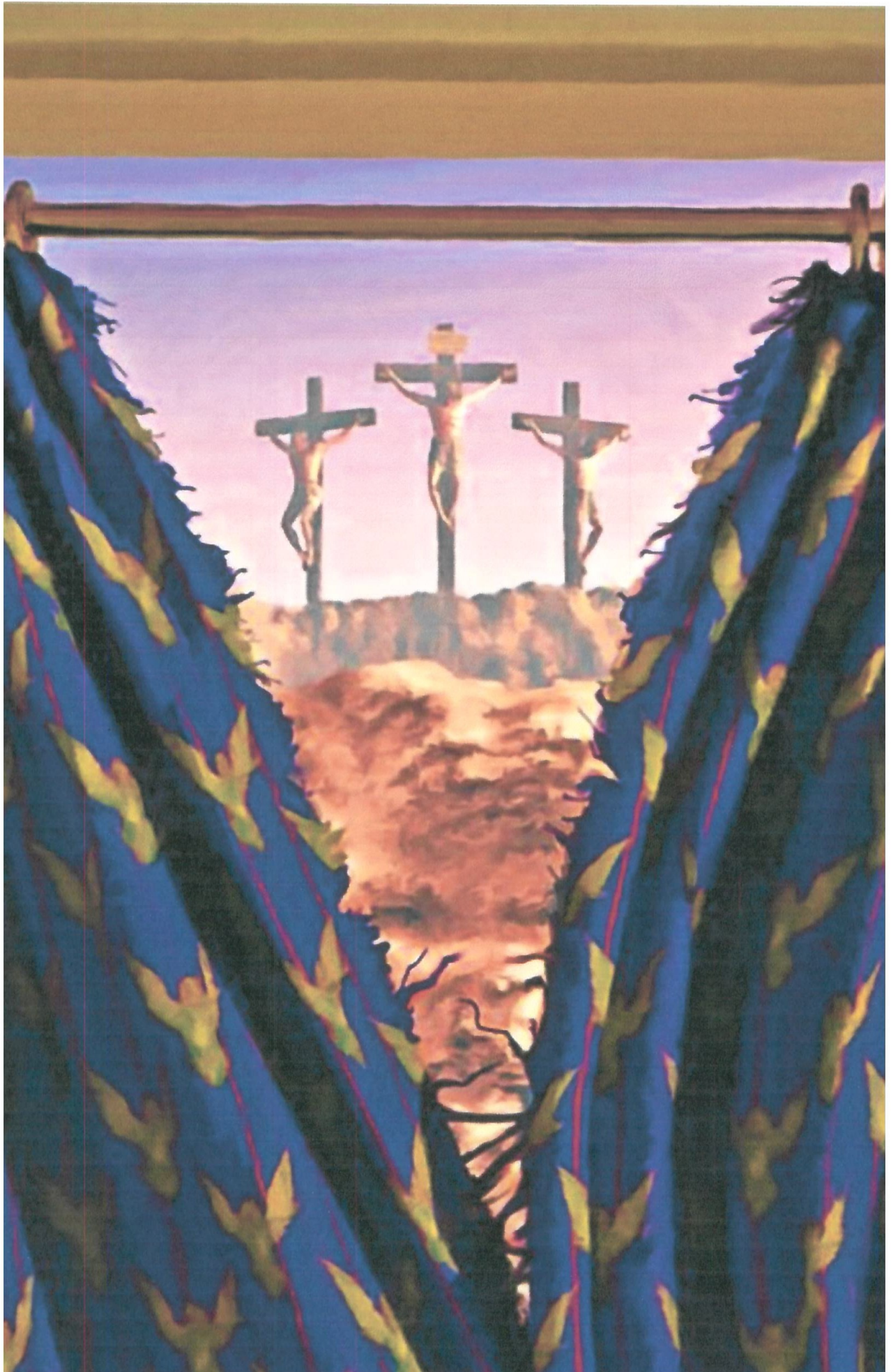


Station 10

Station 12

Mark 15:42-47

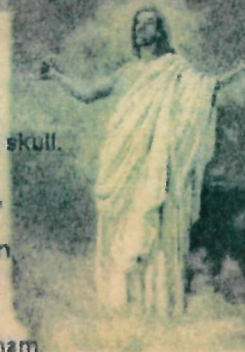
Jesus placed in the tomb

It was Preparation Day (the day before the Sabbath). As evening neared Joseph of Arimathea, a prominent council member, went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. He brought some fine linen cloth, took down the body, wrapped it and laid it in a tomb hewn out of rock and then rolled a stone against the entrance. And Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joseph observed where He was laid.



Calvary

Jesus Christ, 33, of Nazareth, died Friday on Mount Calvary, also known as Golgoths, the place of the skull. Betrayed by the apostle Judas, Jesus was crucified by the Romans, by order of the Ruler Pontius Pilate. The causes of death were crucifixion, extreme exhaustion, severe torture, and loss of blood.



Jesus Christ, a descendant of Abraham, was a member of the house of David. He was the Son of the late Joseph, a carpenter of Nazareth, and Mary, His devoted Mother. Jesus was born in a stable in the city of Bethlehem, Judea. He is survived by His mother Mary, His faithful Apostles, numerous disciples, and many other followers.

Jesus was self educated and spent most of his adult life working as a Teacher. Jesus also occasionally worked as a Medical Doctor and it is reported that he healed many patients. Up until the time of His death, Jesus was teaching and sharing the Good News, healing the sick, touching the lonely, feeding the hungry, and helping the poor.

Jesus was most noted for telling parables about His Father's Kingdom and performing miracles, such as feeding over 5,000 people with only five loaves of bread and two fish, and healing a man who was born blind. On the day before His death, He held a Last Supper celebrating the Passover Feast, at which He foretold His death.

The body was quickly buried in a stone grave, which was donated by Joseph of Arimathea, a loyal friend of the family. By order of Pontius Pilate, a boulder was rolled in front of the tomb. Roman soldiers were put on guard.
